**SUBJECT: INCREASE TO THE INCOME LIMITS FOR THE COMMONWEALTH SENIORS HEALTH CARD**

**Purpose:** To inform staff that the income limits for the Commonwealth Seniors Health Card (CSHC) will increase from 4 November 2022.

**Key Points:**

- From 4 November 2022, new income limits will apply to the eligibility for a CSHC.
- The CSHC income limits will be increased to the following amounts:
  - Single \$90,000
  - Couple (combined) \$144,000
  - Illness separated couple (combined) \$180,000

**Background:**

Legislation to increase the income limits for the CSHC received Royal Assent on 28 October 2022, with the changes commencing seven days later on 4 November 2022. These changes allow more veterans and their partners access to pharmaceutical and medical benefits that the card provides including:

- cheaper medicine under the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme
- bulk billed doctor visits - this is up to your doctor
- a refund for medical costs when you reach the Medicare Safety Net

Your state or territory government and local council may also lower any of these expenses if you hold a CSHC :

- electricity and gas bills
- property and water rates
- health care costs, including ambulance, dental and eye care

- public transport fares.

There is no assets test for the CSHC.

Current annual income limits are:

- Single \$61,284
- Couple (combined) \$98,054
- Illness separated couple (combined) \$122,568

The CSHC income limits will be increased from 4 November 2022 to:

- Single \$90,000
- Couple (combined) \$144,000
- Illness separated couple (combined) \$180,000

### **Legislation:**

The new income limits under the *Social Security Act (1991)* and the *Veterans Entitlement Act (1986)* were passed on 28 October 2022 with the changes commencing seven days later on 4 November 2022
